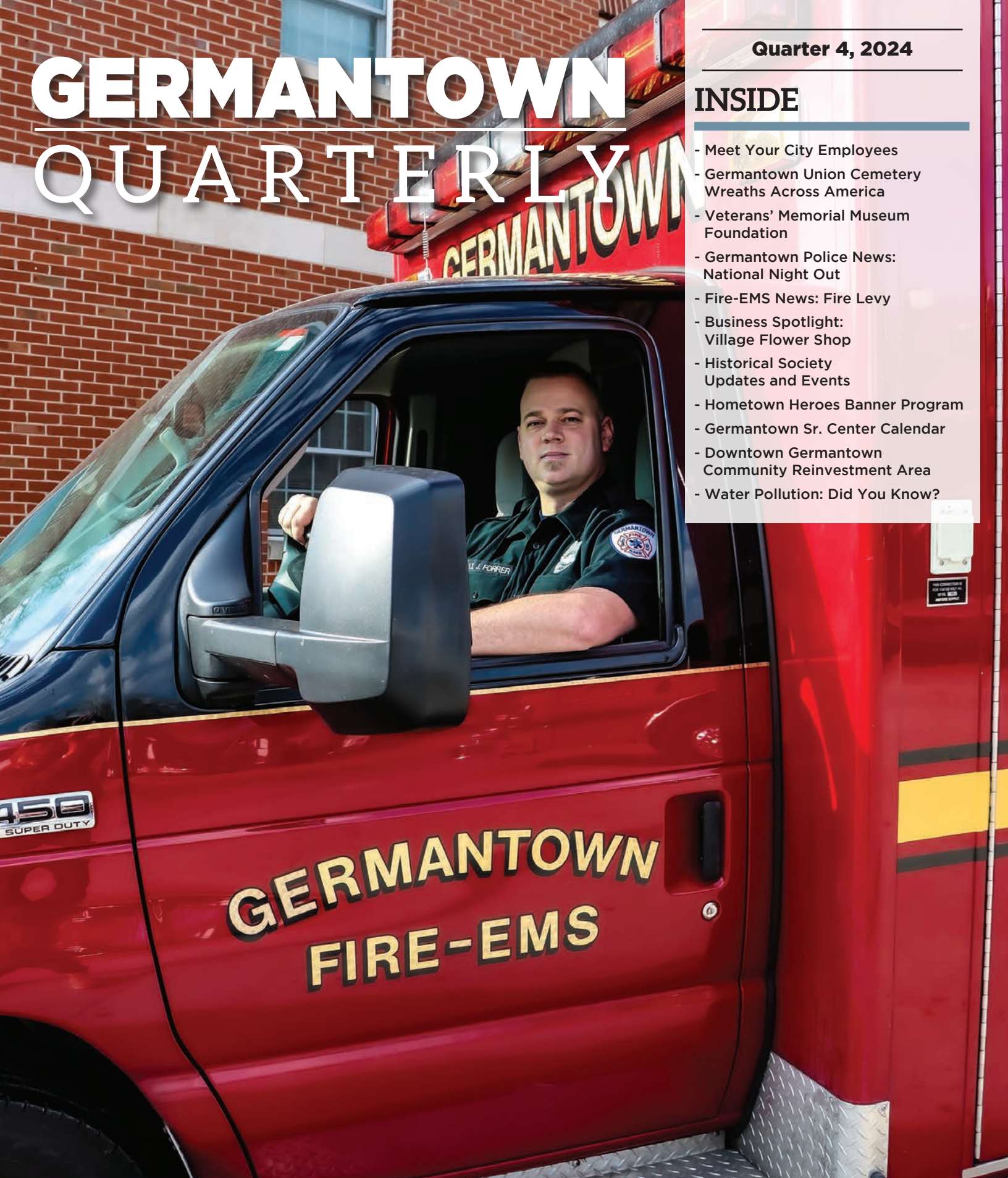

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Meet Your City Employees

MATT BURNS *Police Chief*

Though he grew up and went to school in West Carrollton; Germantown has always been a place that Police Chief Matt Burns has been drawn to. He has a long line of family members and ancestors who lived and worked here, so it was a homecoming of sorts when he was first hired on as a full-time patrol officer in 1988. Chief Burns went on to become GPD's first full-time detective in 1990 and in 1994 was promoted to sergeant. His rise up the command ranks continued when he became lieutenant in 1998. Matt then held the rank of Major/Deputy Chief for several years before receiving promotion to Chief of Police on April 22, 2024.

It seems that Matt was destined for public service, he knew from very early on that it was the path for him. "I always wanted to be a police officer growing up," said Chief Burns. Matt fulfilled that desire right after his high school graduation. He first by served in the United States Marine Corps Reserves as a military police officer from 1982-1988. While still in the Marines, Chief Burns also began civilian police work in 1986 with a short stint at Waynesville Police Department followed by about 1.5 years with the Miami Township Police Department. He also served as a volunteer firefighter for the City of West Carrollton from 1981-1986.

Matt's transition to Chief of Police has thus far gone very well for both him and the department. "The support I have received from City

Council, City Administration, and our troops has made this a great and easy transition," said Chief Burns. He noted that, though he has been with the department for 36 years, he still learns something new every day, an aspect of taking on his new



role that Chief Burns relishes. He also shared that he greatly appreciates his command staff: Deputy Chief Brown, Captain Wale, and Lieutenant Mowery, and the work they have

already put in together on new projects.

One such project involves putting an even greater focus on training and development department-wide. "We are always pushing for more," said Chief Burns. "We want to help our officers think about where they feel their niche is, what their different professional interests and goals are, and we want to enable them to pursue those," he elaborated. Chief Burns finds this employee empowerment to be vital because it allows his officers to take more ownership and responsibility in their work.

Chief Burns loves to spend his time away from work with his family. He married his high school sweetheart, Kim, in 1985. Together they have 3 daughters and now 6 grandchildren. They are very outdoorsy people. "We do a lot of bike-riding, kayaking, and boating. We always try to take at least one trip all together each year, and they're always focused on the outdoors," said Chief Burns. He also shared that he could not have gotten to where he is without the support of his family and the foundation of his beliefs.

Germantown has been fortunate to have Chief Burns serving our community for 36 years. When asked what led him to put down

roots here, Chief Burns answered, "I feel at home here. You really become family working in Germantown." Thank you, Chief Burns, for all the ways you serve our community!

Weekdays by appointment, groups welcome.

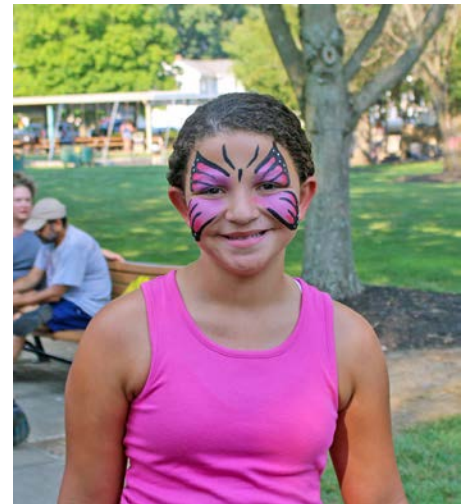

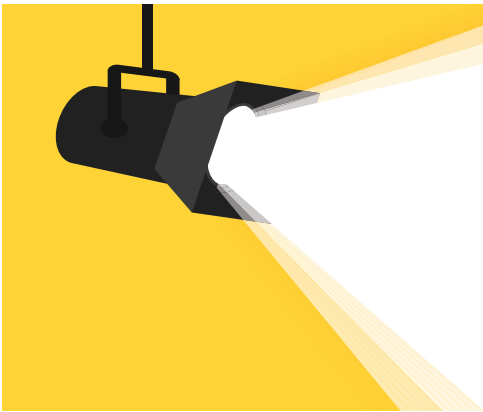
The Museum is manned by a professional all-volunteer staff who hopes to see you soon!

Germantown Business Spotlight

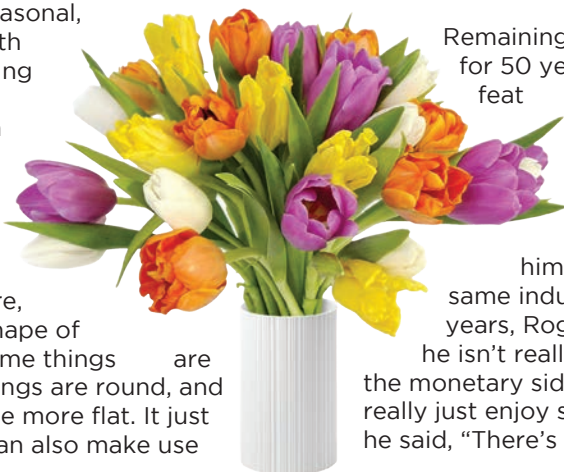
Village Flower Shop

To have a passion and be able to pursue it is a gift. This is something that is true for Roger Nearing, owner of the Village Flower Shop, who always knew that he wanted to be a florist. He began his career with the Patterson Floral Gardens when they were north of town. He worked there for 10 years until he received the opportunity to start at the flower shop in August of 1974, meaning he soon will have been in business for 50 years. For the last 20 of those, Roger has worked with Sheila Bradley in the shop as well. While originally planned as a short-term arrangement, it has turned into a lasting and effective partnership, to the benefit of the shop.

As one would expect, things do not stay the same over the course of a long career. "Expectations have changed, but an individual basically has their own style. My work from when I first started my career looks nothing like the things I make today. I have developed a style of my own over time." When designing a given piece, Roger explained that he will consider what type of occasion it is for, and then begin to look through his inventory. "I can't carry everything, so some of it depends on what I have available. Everything is seasonal, so I make do with what I have. Doing so can actually make creating a lot more fun." As far as the actual design, Roger said that he looks at color and texture, as well as the shape of the flowers. "Some things are spikes, some things are round, and some flowers are more flat. It just depends. You can also make use

of the space they fill, with a more vertical or horizontal flower."

Though it is a very creative occupation, there are still many business considerations and operations that Roger has to handle daily. One of those is sourcing his flowers. There are about 4 wholesale houses, 1 in Dayton and 3 in Cincinnati, which he greatly trusts. Roger then considers availability and price when selecting flowers. He does his best not to overstock and end up throwing out unused flowers. He also goes to great lengths to pick flowers that are not overly expensive, in order to better serve his patrons. If a customer is looking for a specific flower, there is generally a good chance Roger can have it for you, and in a timely manner.



Remaining in business for 50 years is quite a feat and is not something that happens by accident. When asked what has kept him going in the same industry all these years, Roger told us that he isn't really motivated by the monetary side of things, "I really just enjoy selling flowers," he said, "There's a lot of truth

to that." He went on to explain that his job is not really a typical 9-5 gig, as being selective with his supply and going home and completing bookwork keeps him busy. However, the satisfaction he feels from his



customers makes it all worth it. "It feels good to get the positive feedback from people. Customer satisfaction really makes you feel good and is a big part of why I continue to do what I do," he shared. No matter the occasion his

flowers are a part of, it also makes Roger happy to know that he can help add some joy to it through his work.

Since his first year of operation, Roger has always offered a Christmas Open House the Sunday after Thanksgiving, with this year marking his 51st. This is an event that takes a lot of preparation, beginning all the way back in August. With the holidays soon upon us, residents are encouraged to mark your calendars for this annual event. You don't have to be a flower expert to order a beautiful bouquet from Roger. If you stop in the store and share what sort of colors or even a feeling or aesthetic you're looking for, the Village Flower Shop is certain to provide you with a gorgeous, hand-crafted arrangement that is sure to please.



What You Need to Know About

There will be a 4 mill levy for Germantown Fire-EMS which will be voted on N for your consideration, such as what sort of vehicles/equipment the Fire Dep department, the cost of this levy for residents, and how the levy will compare

The NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) provides recommendations for how long Fire and EMS vehicles should be used. If a vehicle is more than 15 years old, but has been properly maintained and is still in serviceable condition, it is recommended it be placed in “reserve” status. This means the vehicle can still be used, but only if a newer vehicle has already been called out to another emergency. Vehicles that are over 25 years old are recommended to be replaced and no longer utilized.

as well as the year they were manufactured. Those highlighted in yellow fall under the NFPA’s “reserve” status and those in red the “replacement.”

As one can see, many of the Germantown Fire-EMS vehicles are older than would be desired. While they have been well-maintained, there is still a worry that their effectiveness will not last. New vehicles will need to be purchased. Figure 2 shows the prices for some different Fire and EMS vehicles, both current as well as from 2009 and 2010, the time of the previous levy.

This is a 123% increase for ambulances and a 100% increase for firetrucks.

Fuel prices for these vehicles have also risen by 41%, going from \$2.98/gallon for diesel in 2010 to \$4.21/gallon in 2024.

Figure 1 shows the vehicles currently used by Germantown Fire-EMS,

Having high-functioning equipment and vehicles is crucial for a fire department, but you must also have an effective workforce to operate them. In 2021, GFE became a staffed station due to lack of

volunteers. This lack of volunteers was causing an inability to staff emergency apparatus at all times of the day for responses, a problem almost all volunteer departments are facing. Though it resulted in an expenditure increase to the budget, this move to a staffed station enabled our department to provide protection for the community 24/7.

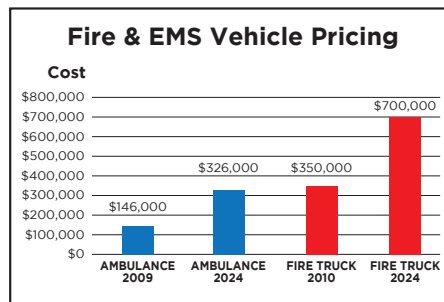

The challenge that small departments like Germantown Fire-EMS faces is two-fold. Firstly, we do not have the funds to offer many full-time positions, so promising prospects sometimes go to bigger departments. Secondly, we must also do our best to remain competitive with the part-time positions we can offer; otherwise we can also lose candidates to other smaller departments.

Standards set by the NFPA state that each fire engine and ladder company should be staffed with a minimum of four firefighters. GFE

at the Upcoming Fire/EMS Levy

November 5th. The last levy was passed in 2010, 14 years ago. Below are listed some items the department will need to purchase in the coming years, the need for additional staff within the department, and the need for similar communities within the region.

currently operates at this minimum. We staff a crew of three cross-trained Fire-EMS personnel assisted by the Fire Chief. Additionally, if the ambulance is on a call while a fire response is needed, this leaves only one member plus the Fire Chief to handle the other emergency. Since 2010, call volumes have risen by 12.5%, with less staff to now work them (961 in 2010 and

1081 in 2023). With this increase, it is recommended that a crew of four cross-trained personnel be staffed in the very near future.

Adding a fourth crew member will allow this department to better handle your emergency by having more staff on hand for those crucial calls that

require more manpower, such as cardiac arrest, motor vehicle crashes, and structure fires.

In order to attract and retain employees, a pay increase will be needed. Figure 3 is the current pay scale for GFE, as well as two other similar, nearby departments, which are both higher than ours.

As previously shown, prices have continuously risen since 2010, while the funding from the Fire-EMS levy has remained the same. The proposed levy on the November 5th

ballot is for 4 mills. This increase would still be lower than other communities in the region, with Farmersville at 7.5 mills, New Lebanon at 10 mills, Camden at 7.5 mills, and Miami Township at 11 mills.



But how much would this increase cost the average resident? The proposed levy will cost a taxpayer with a \$200,000.00 valuation in Germantown and German Township approximately \$280.00 additionally per year. That comes out to \$23.33 per month or \$5.38 per week. At \$5.38 per week, this ensures that a fire truck or ambulance is able to come to you in any emergency.

HOLIDAY HOME TOUR

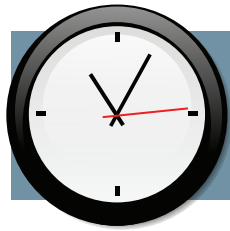

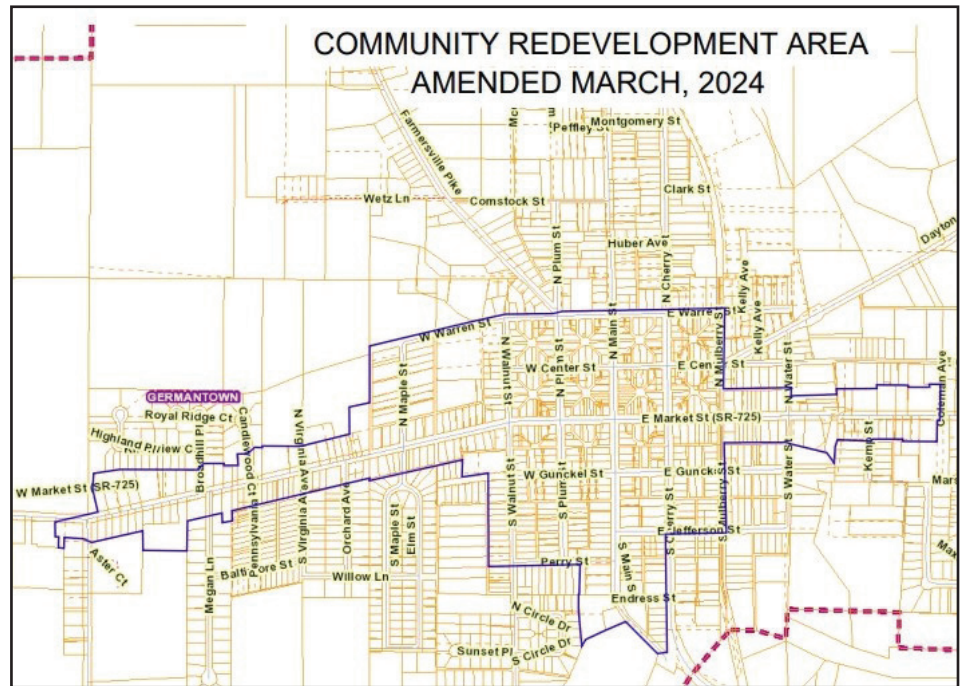

COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA

The Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) in Downtown Germantown has been expanded. Property owners in this district may apply for real property tax exemptions on renovations to or construction of new buildings. These abatements can last up to 15 years and stay with the property, even if ownership changes. This agreement must be struck before construction begins. Examples of qualifying projects include: building a new porch, adding a garage, remodeling an attic into living space, installing a sun room, new additions to the structure, new construction, structural improvements, or complete rehabs. Essentially, this means any project that would add to the assessed value of your property by the county auditor. LEAF COLLECTION BEGINS

Leaf collection is provided to all the Germantown residents who live adjacent to a public roadway. The City will collect leaves mid-October thru mid-December, weather permitting. Please rake your leaves to the edge of your property in an open area where they are accessible to the crews, not behind parked cars, mail boxes, trees, shrubs, etc. The Street Department will be collecting leaves daily. Leaves will not be picked up on holidays. The City will continue to allow residents to bring leaves to the Service Department located at 148 S. Water Street between the hours of 7 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. Please place leaves in the designated area. Bagged leaves must be emptied and the bags taken with you. Brush is not accepted.
